PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 27th July. Apologies for absence were received from Mr Woods and Mr Elliott. Five Councillors were present, as were Mr Bowles and the Clerk. Apologies for absence were also received from Mr Bobbin, who has been elected to Deputy Mayor of Swale Borough Council, which was considered to be a just reward for this long-serving public servant. The minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday 29th June were signed as a true record.

Matters arising: at last some progress is being made to evict the illegal presence of a traveller on the old Silver Sands Nursery site - a writ has been issued and a hearing will shortly take place in court.

Reports: Mr Morsman has received a complaint about motorcycles being ridden on waste land at High Street. He also complained that the "School" sign at the original site is still in place, and thinks that it should be moved nearer to the present school. Mr Chapman also reported on a Boundary Commission meeting he had attended at Sittingbourne. The outcome of the meeting will take many years to implement. He also said that the ever-ongoing problem of flooding in the area of his residence has

taken a new turn and that something different is to be tried. Mrs Taylor spoke of the problems of printing the July issue of the 'News', due to the lack of supplies of toner. After discussion, it was decided to wait for the toner to arrive rather than to make alternative (and costly) arrangements to have it printed elsewhere.

Correspondence: Swale residents can now get help from local engagement and regeneration grants, and the Clerk is to make the necessary enquiries. South East Water has informed the Clerk of further disruption in the Parish. To connect the new main to the rest of the network, it will be necessary to close Church Hill from the Staplestreet junction to Crockham Lane to through traffic between September 12th and October 7th. Access for residents will be maintained throughout the work. Diversions for through traffic will be through Staplestreet, Kemsdale Road and Kays Lane. A closure order for four weeks had been made but it is hoped work won't take that long. (Mrs Taylor has since extracted a promise from South East Water that the closure will be finished before the 30th September when the Flower Festival is due to start.) Be aware also that there will be work taking place in the Graveney area. All present were critical of the inconvenience being

caused - largely, the work is being done by the 'moling' system, which involves only small amounts of actual excavation, but the contractors apparently still believe in maximum disruption in this

allegedly modern age.

There being no further business the Chairman declared the meeting to be closed at about 9 00pm.

FROM THE VICAR

The wedding season has started late in Hernhill Church this year. By this time last year all the Hernhill Church weddings had finished, but this year they only just started last month with the wedding of Naomi Morgan (of Staplestreet) and Jonathan Colm-



er. This year I have four weddings or blessings of marriage booked for St Michael's Church but for next year I already have three weddings booked and three other couples hoping to get married in St Michael's. The increase is because couples are beginning to realise it is now easier to get married in church than previously. The Church of England also decided recently not to put its charges up by over 50% so a church wedding is not expensive when compared to other venues.

The Church of England changed its

rules back in October 2008 so you now don't have to be resident in the parish

to get married, you do need to have a connection such as being baptised or confirmed in the parish or have lived in the parish for at least six months, (there are other qualifying connections so it is worth asking

me if you are interested). If you don't have a connection there is still hope, if one of the couple worships regularly in St Michael's for six months then they are entitled to get married in St Michael's, these rules work for any church in the Church of England.

Why get married in church? The beautiful setting of St Michael's is one big draw for many couples but there is also the feeling that getting married in church is the right thing to do and an ancient church like St Michael's gives a sense of continuity. Think of the count-

less couples over the centuries who have stood in the same place and made the same promises. A ceremony in church also includes God's blessing on a marriage, this is an attraction for many couples whatever their beliefs. We wish all our couples who are getting married in church this summer a very happy wedding day, a long marriage and deepening love, trust and commit-

THE FIRST RESIDENTS at ME13 9JX

In the spring of 1955 Iris and I together with Clifford moved into a house in Hernhill. It had a large garden backing onto coppice woodland. The soil was sand and we had a morello cherry tree in the far corner of the plot.

Over the next few years we grew all our vegetables and occasionally found a number of sharp flints, never from the same spot. Our interest in these flints was increased when Iris discovered a large flint which appeared to be a scrapper or possibly an axe head.

Some years later I took my collection to Dr Pat Reid, Director of the Faversham Archaeological group and this lady confirmed that the axe head alone was over 2000



years old. On her recommendation I contacted the Portable Antiques Scheme Department at Kent County Council in Maidstone.

I have recently received confirmation from Mr Matt Butler that some of my finds date from the Mesolithic period through to the Neolithic period. My collection includes 22 blades, two flakes (scrappers) eight flakes of flint debitage (waste material) and one axe head, slightly worn but in good condition.

Neolithic period -
4500BC to 1500BC
Mesolithic period -
10500BC to 4500BC

Manufactured method -
'knapping'
Question: "What type of tool did they use for knapping"?

Answers please - on a stone tablet.
