## PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 30th May. All Councillors were present, as were Mr Bowles, the Clerk and three members of the public. The minutes of the previous meeting held on 25th April 2012 were signed as a true record.

Matters arising: the enquiries into the viability of organising an allotment organisation in the parish proceeds. Mr Woods, the Councillor representing the Parish's input, stated that the venture must be in accordance with various matters e.g., fencing of the plots, the possible introduction of water onto the site, not to mention insurance. He said that the next moves would include a search for possible areas of land available for the purpose.

Reports: Mr Morsman again queried the responsibility of either Swale Borough Council or KCC for the provision of road signage. Mr. Bowles said that the former dealt with minor local signs (e.g., "Kay's Lane) but that KCC were supposed to deal with direction signage, and that there was a huge backlog in this department. Mr Morsman also commented on the unsatisfactory actions of dog walkers and their disposal of their animal's

mess. Some persons gather it up and bag it and then leave the bag either in the grass or hanging on a fence or tree. Councillors were disgusted at the cavalier way in which many dog walkers treat this matter. The Clerk announced his retirement on 30th September next, after nearly 25 years of service, for which he was thanked. Notices advertising the vacancy are to be displayed. The closing date for applications is to be 31st July.

The Clerk reported that the Council's financial matters had been processed by the External Auditor, who had made no adverse comments except to say that he considered the balance at year end to be at a borderline limit. In any case, Council Tax payers should be aware that next year's Precept will show a rise on 2012/3.

Correspondence: no comments were offered on KCC's Mineral and Waste Local plans. Consultation on the appointment of an external auditor will be of no benefit to the Parish, partly because the Precept will, in the foreseeable future, remain below £20,000.

There being no further business the Chairman declared the meeting to be closed at about 9.00pm.

- A team of parents, who spent two days filling, digging and levelling the beds;

- Finally, to our families, for helping to fill the beds on the Bring a Plant Day on May 11th.

The weather held for the afternoon and photos show that it was a memorable occasion. The result has exceeded our expectations. All the children had a 'hands on' moment and I hope they will remember this effort in years to come.

We are having a Garden Party on the afternoon of June 1st to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee and hope to be able to sit in the new garden....weather permitting!

Once again, many thanks to all who supported us in the creation of the garden.

#### FROM THE VICAR

Depending on your point of view here begins a summer of celebration and excitement – the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, Euro 2012 (England's first match is Monday 11 June), Wimbledon, the Olympics and the Paralympics - I wonder how much work will get done in the next few months?

Sixty years on the throne is no mean achievement for British monarchs, only Queen Victoria has reigned for longer. The Queen's Diamond Jubilee is a great moment in the life of this country and we celebrate the life of someone who is clearly very special. Our Queen has given herself unreservedly to serving this country and the Commonwealth and embodies many virtues which are perhaps unfashionable today. Paul Valley named them as 'service, commitment, discretion, loyalty,

resilience and . . . modesty. Above all there is a sense of duty. . . . What the Queen shows is that the ideal of public service is not so much old-fashioned as timeless.' We would all do well to rediscover such qualities. It is not about the cult of personality for the Queen and the same thought struck me about Archbishop Rowan as he gave his Holy Week lectures in Canterbury Cathedral.

Our Queen's Christian faith is there as a rock in her life, underpinning all she does and sustaining her in her darker moments. The following Prayer was written at The Queen's direction by the Chapter of St Paul's Cathedral for her Diamond Jubilee and it will be used in the Jubilee Thanksgiving Service in St Paul's Cathedral on Tuesday 5th June as well as our own service in Hernhill Church on Sunday 3rd June.

God of time and eternity,  
whose Son reigns as servant, not  
master;  
we give you thanks and praise  
that you have blessed this Nation, the  
Realms and Territories  
with Elizabeth our beloved and  
glorious Queen.  
In this year of Jubilee,  
grant her your gifts of love and joy

and peace  
as she continues in faithful obedience  
to you, her Lord and God  
and in devoted service to her lands  
and peoples,  
and those of the Commonwealth,  
now and all the days of her life;

### FRIENDS RELAUNCH

You will have noticed that a great deal of work has been done to restore our lovely church St Michael's. Parts of the building had deteriorated considerably and parts were unsafe. The Restoration Fund Committee has put in a huge effort to raise the £160,000 needed for the work by fund raising events and applications for grants. The village owes all those involved a tremendous thanks. That, of course, is not the end of the story. It is important that St Michael's continues as an active place of worship, a building that is open daily for people to visit and spend times of quiet contemplation and where people can come to celebrate marriage, baptism or find solace in loss and remember the life of a loved one. Each year it costs over £30,000 to run the church with heating

and lighting, insurance, the parish share to the Diocese, general expenses and there are always minor repairs to attend to. This money has to be raised each year – there are no grants.

"The Friends of St Michael's" was started about ten years ago. This scheme is an opportunity for contributions from people who may not be worshippers at the church but who want to see the church used and well looked after. This contribution is by way of a yearly subscription of £30 and members of the scheme are acknowledged on a list in the church porch. Members also receive newsletters to update them on what is happening in the church, forthcoming events and the state of church finances.

At one time the 'Friends' were contributing around £2,000 which was a signif-

icant amount of income for the church. Recently, for various reasons, the 'Friends' have somewhat lapsed and this income has decreased. I would like to reinvigorate the scheme and ask you to read the leaflet enclosed in this Hershill News. Please, if you can, support the scheme and fill in the form, gift aid

your subscription if you are a tax payer, and return the form to me. I'm sure that the majority of villagers consider St Michael's to be an important part of the Village and wish to see it to continue as an active place of worship.

Nevertheless, the event still raised over £3,000 and all involved are to be heartily congratulated. If we were in Greece now with all their financial problems we probably could not have run the Fete at all.

As I write this I am looking forward to the events in the Village that are planned in celebration of the Jubilee (so is auntie). By the time that you read it, the celebrations will probably be history. I hope that you viewed all the delightful scarecrows scattered round and about. They were great fun. I also hope that the weather was kind and that you have had a really enjoyable time. I remember that both the 25th and the 50th celebrations were blessed

There was a leak on the road from the Dove to Dunkirk that was not repaired for nearly two years. Whilst it was not a major water spout, over such a long time the loss must have been considerable.

One, the aquifers will get another spell of being topped-up and, two, the 'News' will be out a little later than usual.
