PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 31st August. All councillors were present as were Councillor Bowles and two members of the public. The minutes of the last meeting were signed as a true record.

Matters arising: The person most affected by the travellers at the Silver Sands site gave an up-to-date account of the situation. So far he said that he had attended Court on the due date but the case in which he was interested – the injunction against the travellers – had been yet further adjourned until October.

Mr Chapman said that a fresh approach was to be made to stem the flooding near the old shop. A drain is to be made in the pavement. This work will necessitate road closure for a period.

Mr Elliott spoke of the purchase of a new printer. Discussion took place as to where it could be

stored, the need or otherwise of insuring it, its cost and the cost of a servicing contract if any. Details will be finalised at the September meeting.

Financial report: the Clerk said that that Audit Commission had completed its annual inspection and professed itself satisfied.

Correspondence: the Queen's Diamond Jubilee was discussed. The Parish Council is to organise the beacon. Invitations are to be made to the public as to how they would wish the celebrations to be set up and perhaps to make suggestions to local Councillors. Kent Highways has sent a copy of the positions of all drains in the Parish and councillors will be given a copy. The quality of the broadband in the Village appears to be reasonable and considerably better than some other parishes in the Swale area.

RESTORATION FUND 1878

The Restoration Fund has featured many times over the past few years because it has been and is a major project for the Village. Approaching 150 years ago the Village was engaged in similar restoration and refurbishment of the church. In 1826 work was done on the porch into the North aisle but the major work of restoration took place in the late 1870's and was completed in 1878.

This work was largely concerned with the fabric of the building. As now, there were many things that needed attention. Some of the

stonework, coping stones and window mullions had deteriorated. Like us, they had work to do on the roof and they had problems with the rainwater gutters. With local help they also cleaned up the cemetery and had the surrounding wall built. Also, as now, there was much to do inside the church. The lath and plaster that was hiding the roof beams was taken down and some of the beams thus exposed had to be replaced. The floor was levelled with concrete and the gangways were tiled. A plaster partition over the rood

screen was removed to bring in light from the east window and a gallery that obscured light from the west window was also removed. The box pews in the nave and the pulpit were replaced by those that exist today. For the improved comfort of the parishioners, a boiler was installed to heat the church.

The total cost of this work was £1,400 of which £200 was still outstanding at the celebratory reopening of the church in March 1878. This equates to £127,000 in present day values. That is not unlike the cost of the present projects. In those days the only way to raise the money was to appeal to local people. Nearly all of the money came from individual donors in and around the Village, much of it from the local clergy. Most of the gifts were of one or two

guineas (£1.10 and £2.20) but the Archbishop gave £70.00 and £50.00 each came from the Vicar (J. F. Thorpe), Nash Court and Mount Ephraim. At the other end of the scale, "two poor women" gave two shillings and sixpence each. To put those gifts in perspective, a vicar in 1881 was earning £315p.a, a skilled craftsman was earning £87p.a. and an agricultural worker got £42p.a. In those terms the gifts were astonishingly generous.

The Vicar still had in mind installing an organ, new pews for the choir and a clock. In time they were all forthcoming but sadly not in his lifetime. However, his great achievement was to ensure that the church that is such a feature of our local landscape is still there for us to enjoy.

VILLAGE HALL AGM

Thank you to all of you who attended the AGM on Monday 1st August. It was nice to see three new faces!!

The Committee reviewed last year's performance financially and explained its decisions behind actions taken to update and improve

the Village Hall. The comments received from those using the hall have been very encouraging and supportive of the works completed to date.

The Chairman thanked the Committee, the Parish Council, the Fete Committee for their donation, the Red Lion for taking bookings and the cleaner, Ruth Thody, for their continued support. Barbara Taylor thanked the Chairman on behalf of the Committee for his work during the last year.

It was agreed in principle to proceed with the total refit of the kitchen to bring it up to date and provide a much needed facelift to this area. Final costs are being sought before proceeding but it's expected to be in the region of £14,500 when completed. This will bring to an end the current schedule of works in the Village Hall for the time. We are in talks with the DCA about providing a more "Community" style building maximising the use of both to meet the changing needs of our Community. This would be part of a much larger "upgrade" of the buildings to allow them to continue giving good service to the community for many years to come.

The Kitchen works we are undertaking will not be affected by any future changes which is why we are proceeding now.

The question of "Committee Members" was again raised by me as I have not been trampled in the rush of volunteers!. As previously advised I will be standing down as Chairman next year after the 2012 AGM, so a new Chairman is required, along with I believe at least two other Committee members to help spread the small load of work more widely and take pressure off other Committee members who have served far longer than me.

So, PLEASE DO NOT JUST READ THIS AND PUT IT DOWN - if you are a long term member of the Community or a newcomer, why not get involved and support your community service. It's not hard work, only meeting six times a year for about an hour, and can be very rewarding. 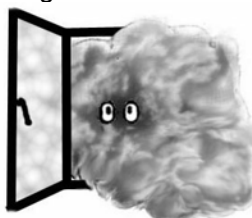
Garden waste that cannot be composted is a damned nuisance. It is a nuisance for the gardener and for the neighbours. It means a bonfire is needed to get rid of it. Carefully ensuring that the wind is in the right direction before you light the fire, you can guarantee that the wind will change. The minute that the smoke is thickest, the wind will turn right round and blow straight into your neighbour's open window.

There is no best time for a bonfire, but the Swale.website does have some helpful advice.

"It is a common misconception that there are specific byelaws prohibiting garden bonfires or specifying times they can be lit - there aren't.

However, this is not a licence for indiscriminate burning! Occasionally a bonfire is the best practicable way to dispose of woody or diseased waste that cannot be composted. And bonfires are used to mark traditional celebrations - especially November 5th.....If you do have a bonfire to dispose of garden waste, or on Bonfire Night follow our good bonfire guidelines.

- Only burn dry material.
- Never burn household rubbish, rubber tyres or anything containing plastic, foam or paint.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions - smoke hangs in the air on damp, still days. If it is too windy, smoke blows into neighbours' gardens and windows and across roads.

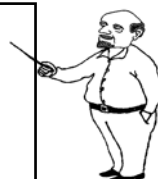


- Avoid burning when air pollution levels in your area are high or very high.
- Keep your fire away from trees, fences and buildings.
- Never use oil, petrol or methylated spirits to light a fire - you could damage yourself as well as the environment.
- Never leave a fire unattended or leave it to smoulder - put it out."
